ABOUT THIS REPORT

Puerto Ricans in Connecticut account for the largest share of the Hispanic/Latino population in the state. This economic profile contains a summary of 2021 aggregate data on occupation, occupation by industry, classification of the workforce, median income and family rates of poverty for Puerto Ricans in Connecticut.

Where did we get this information from?


The data for this report was gathered from annual American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau.

Occupation by Industry

In 2021, the highest proportions of Puerto Ricans were employed in educational services, healthcare and social assistance jobs (28.2%) or in retail industry (15.3%).

Puerto Ricans were employed at a higher rate than Hispanics and the general population of Connecticut in these industries.



CLASSIFICATION OF WORKFORCE

The majority (82%) of Puerto Ricans, like Hispanics (83.5%) and the general population (80.1%), were private wage and salary workers in 2021.


Puerto Ricans had the lowest (4.5%) rate of self-employment compared to Hispanics (5.4%) and the general population (6.4%) of Connecticut.

Median Income


In 2021 the median income of Puerto Ricans (\$43,391) in Connecticut was lower than that of Hispanics (\$54,754) and almost half of that of the general population (\$83,771) of the state.

FAMILY RATE OF POVERTY

The poverty rate of Puerto Rican families (21%) in Connecticut was higher than the rate of Hispanics (17%) and three times as high as the rates of the general population (7%) of the state in 2021.
