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About Puerto Rican Population

Puerto Ricans in Connecticut are the largest Hispanic or Latino population in the state of Connecticut.

Puerto Ricans are the second largest Hispanic or Latino population in the nation.

2/3 of all Puerto Ricans reside in the mainland and 1/3 in the Puerto Rican islands.



Population changes in Connecticut, 2016-2021

- Although Connecticut did not gain as many Puerto Rican residents as other states as a result of the displacements/migrations caused by hurricanes Irma and Maria, it also did not loose as many Puerto Ricans as other states during the COVID pandemic.
- Connecticut has the 6th largest Puerto Rican population in the United States.
- Connecticut gained 3,782 Puerto Ricans between 2016 and 2019. This population increase was largely driven by the post-Hurricane Maria displacement/migration to Connecticut.
- Overall Connecticut lost 9,323 Puerto Rican residents between 2016 and 2021.
- The reported losses of Puerto Rican residents between 2019 and 2021 are only slightly higher than the margin of error for the 2019 and 2021 American Community Surveys.





Age


In 2021, the median age of Puerto Ricans (30) was similar to that of Hispanics (31) and significantly lower than the general (41) population of Connecticut.

About a third of Puerto Ricans residing in Connecticut are under the age of 18.

Puerto Ricans, like Hispanics, are proportionately younger than the average resident in Connecticut.








Median Income

In 2021 the median income of Puerto Ricans (\$43,391) in Connecticut was lower than that of Hispanics (\$54,754) and almost half of that of the general population (\$83,771) of the state.

Median Income



Family Rate of Poverty

The poverty rate of Puerto Rican families (21%) in Connecticut was higher than the rate of Hispanics (17%) and three times as high as the rates of the general population (7%) of the state in 2021.

ABOUT THIS REPORT

Central to the discussion of the location/residence of Puerca Ricans in the United States are impacts on the displacement/migration of silands-based Puerca Ricans caused by push factors such as the economic conditions of Puerca Rica, climate events like hurricanes Iran/Maria and Fions, cartilopaukes, and the COVID pandemic. The mobility of Puerca Ricans is also contingent on pull factors used as the presence of kin/family and friends outside of Puerca Rica as well as friendly labor conditions in various states.

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WHAT IS OUR SOURCE OF DATA?

This Data Report provides a simple overview of the Puerto Rican population change in the United States between 2016 and 2021. The mobility of Puerto Ricans includes mobility of Puerto Ricans between Puerto Rico and the states as well as among the states

The data for this report was gathered from annual American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the US Census Bureau. The U.S. Census Bureau, however, does not publish data on states that have Puerto Rican population at or lower than margin of error for a corresponding year of American Community Survey.

The 2021 U.S. Cenus estimated that the current population of Putron Ricans in the United States at 9,061,871. About two-thirds (5,789,287) of the Putro Rican live in the states or the District of Columbia and one-third (3,263,584) reside in the Putron Rican lidapora in the Use account for 99 hours District adjapora in the Use account for 99 the Hispanic or Latino population and about 2% of the total population.

The 2021 U.S. Census estimated that Hispanics accounted for 17% or 637,113 residents of Connecticut. Puerto Ricans made more than half of the Hispanic population and 8% or 288,922 of the residents of Connecticut.





So, why does this project matter?

- There is a vacuum of information/data on Puerto Ricans in Connecticut and the U.S. more generally.
- The main research center that focuses on Puerto Ricans, CENTRO or the Center for Puerto Rican Studies (Hunter College, CUNY) has moved to a cultural center approach, creating a hole in available public analysis of data on Puerto Ricans. We are trying to fill this gap.
- Some of this type of research has already been used to secure significant funding for projects addressing the needs of Puerto Ricans in Connecticut.
- The PRSI is already creating a public repository of information about Puerto Ricans in Connecticut and elsewhere that is unrivalled.
