

2021 POPULATION PROFILE OF PUERTO RICANS IN THE COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD, CONNECTICUT

Population count

- In 2021, Fairfield County had the largest population in the state, with a population size of 956,446. At least 27% of Connecticut's overall population resided in Fairfield County.
- In 2021, there were 53,738 Puerto Ricans residing in Fairfield County and comprised 6% of the county's overall population.

RACE/ETHNICITY

• A little more than half (52%) of the Puerto Rican population in this county identified as one race, 46% as two races, and the remaining 2% as three races.


HISPANIC/LATINO ETHNICITY

• About 27% of the Hispanic/Latino population of Fairfield County were Puerto Ricans followed by South Americans (26%), Central Americans (16%), Other Hispanic/Latinos (12%), Dominicans (9%), Mexicans (3%), and Cubans (1%).


EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT

- Hispanic/Latino (29%) and Puerto Rican (23%) populations had higher rates of those with 'less than a high school education' compared to the overall population (10%) in Fairfield County.
- More than a third of Puerto Ricans (36%) had a 'high school education', higher than Hispanics/Latinos (29%) and overall population (21%).
- At least 27% of the Puerto Rican population in the county had slightly higher rates among those with 'some college education' compared to Hispanics/Latinos (22%) and overall population (20%).
- Hispanics/Latinos (20%) Puerto Ricans (14%) had the lowest rates of those with a 'bachelor's degree or more' compared to the total population (49%) in this county.



SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

 School enrollment of Puerto Ricans was consistent with the school enrollment of the total and Hispanic populations of Fairfield county.




POVERTY INCOME

- At least a quarter of the Puerto Rican population (24%) lived below poverty in Fairfield County.
- In 2021, the poverty rate among Puerto Ricans (24%) and Hispanics/Latinos (29%) was at least three times higher than that of the total population (9%) in this county.
- At least 33% of Puerto Rican children (under 18) lived in poverty, this was slightly lower than Hispanic/Latino children (37%). However, both Puerto Rican and Hispanic/Latino children were two times more likely to live below poverty compared to all children under 18 (12%) in this county.
- Almost two-thirds of Hispanic/Latina female headed households with children under 18 (57%) lived below poverty followed by Puerto Ricans (36%) and total population (29%) in Fairfield county.

Median household income/ food stamps

- In 2021, Puerto Ricans' (42%) and Hispanics/Latinos (42%) reliance on food stamps was more than four times higher than that of the total population (9%).
- The median household income for Puerto Ricans (\$45,369) living in Fairfield County was lower than Hispanics/Latinos (\$56,937) and more than half lower than that of the total population (\$125,563) in Fairfield County.



EMPLOYMENT STATUS

- The employment status of Puerto Ricans (59%) was lower than that of the Hispanics/Latinos (66%) and the total population (63%) in Fairfield County.
- Unemployment was higher among Puerto Ricans (6%) and Hispanics/Latinos (6%) compared to the total population (4%).


Housing Characteristics

- Homeownership rates among Puerto Ricans (34%) was two times lower than that of the total population (67%) in Fairfield County.
- Puerto Ricans (38%) and Hispanics (42%) paid more of their income towards mortgage payments than the total population (35%).
- In 2021, the median monthly mortgage payment was significantly higher among Hispanics/Latinos (\$2,590) followed by total population (\$1,995) and Puerto Ricans (\$1,622) in this county.
- At least 66% of the Puerto Rican population were renters, this was a higher percentage than Hispanics/ Latinos (60%) and total population (33%) residing in Fairfield County.
- Rent burden, also known as tenants paying at least 30% or more of their incomes towards rents, was higher among Puerto Ricans (61%) followed by Hispanics (61%) and total population (51%).
- Hispanics/Latinos (\$1,603) and the total population (\$1,593) showed similar median rental rates, while Puerto Ricans (\$1,131) paid slightly lower rates.


HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE

- Puerto Ricans (56%) were more likely to rely on public health coverage compared to Hispanics/Latinos (35%) and the total population (32%) in Fairfield County.
- Hispanics/Latinos (19%) were significantly less likely to have health insurance than Puerto Ricans (4%) and the total (8%) population in Fairfield County.



Language spoken at home

• A majority of Puerto Ricans (68%) residing in Fairfield County spoke a language other than English in their households.



WHERE DID WE GET THIS INFORMATION FROM?

We employ the 2021 Census Bureau's American Community Survey (1-year estimates) to examine the general trends of the entire population, including Puerto Rican and Hispanic/Latino communities. Additionally, in geographies with unavailable data, we estimate the Puerto Rican population using the harmonized 2006-2021 microdata provided by IPUMS USA (5-year estimates).
